
## **Region: Loreto**



Region Capital: Iquitos Region Area: 379,827 km<sup>2</sup>

Loreto is one of twenty-five regions in Peru. Located in the northeast interior of Peru, and bordering Ecuador, Columbia and Brazil, Loreto spans a lowland Amazonian forest, and is the largest region in Peru. Other services (e.g., tourism), commerce and mining are predominate economic activities. Iquitos is the region capital. As of 2015, its population was estimated at 1,039,372; with the highest percentage of its population residing in the provinces of Alto Amazonas, Maynas and Requena. Relative to the rest of Peru, the population of Loreto has lower than average life expectancy (71.7 years) and access to improved water (55.8%). Additionally, while Loreto has lower than average illiteracy (5.3%), poverty remains higher (37.4%) than the national average.



## Multi-Hazard Risk (MHR) <sup>1</sup>

#### Score = 0.432, Rank = 20 of 25




Figure 1. Components of the Multi-Hazard Risk Score compared to the national average.

Of the twenty-five regions of Peru, Loreto ranks 20th in multi-hazard risk (MHR = 0.432). Table 1 outlines the individual components that contribute to risk. As shown in the bar chart of Figure 1, Loreto's low multi-hazard risk is a function of its very low multi-hazard exposure (MHE = 0.120), very high vulnerability (V = 0.567), and low coping capacity (CC = 0.390). The ternary graph at right shows that Loreto's exposure is significantly lower than the national average, though its vulnerability and lack of coping capacity are higher.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Multi-Hazard Risk (MHR): An index that measures the likelihood of losses or disruptions to a region's normal function due to interaction between multi-hazard exposure, socioeconomic vulnerability and coping capacity. MHR = (MHE + V + (1-CC))/3. Values range from 0-1.

## Multi-Hazard Exposure (MHE)<sup>3</sup>

#### Score = 0.120, Rank = 25 of 25




Figure 2. Average, raw and relative Multi-Hazard Exposure Scores.

Loreto has very low multi-hazard exposure relative to other regions of Peru (MHE = 0.120). This score is a function of both Raw and Relative MHE, as shown in Figure 2. The Raw MHE Score is an index reflecting the absolute value of population exposed to multiple hazards. This score can aid in understanding the overall scale of hazard exposure. The Relative MHE Score is an index reflecting the proportion of the region's base population exposed. This score can assist in the determination of how important hazards are, and can help prioritize disaster management activities across regions. Estimates of exposure by hazard type are summarized in Table 2.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Multi Hazard Exposure (MHE): An index based on the estimated average exposure of the population to six hazard types: tsunamis, landslides, extreme temperature, earthquakes (MMI VII and above), floods and volcanos. Average exposure considers both raw average exposure and relative average exposure as a proportion of total population. Values range from 0-1.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> **Ambient Population**: 24-hour average estimate of the population; typically differs from census population.

## Vulnerability (V) 5

#### Score = 0.567, Rank = 3 of 25

Loreto has very high vulnerability relative to other Peruvian regions (V = 0.567). The bar chart on the right displays the composition of its overall Vulnerability Score. As shown, vulnerability in Loreto is driven primarily by clean water access, recent disaster impacts, and population pressures. The table below summarizes the individual indicators within each socio-economic theme.




Figure 3. Components of the Vulnerability Score by relative contribution.

## Coping Capacity (CC)<sup>6</sup>

#### Score = 0.390, Rank = 20 of 25

Loreto has a low coping capacity relative to other regions (CC = 0.390). The bar chart on the right displays the composition of its overall Coping Capacity Score. As shown, coping capacity in Loreto is hindered primarily by its infrastructure (especially transportation and healthcare) and economic capacity. The table below summarizes the individual indicators within each socioeconomic theme.




Figure 4. Components of the Coping Capacity Score by relative contribution.

### Resilience (R)<sup>7</sup>

#### Score = 0.412, Rank = 21 of 25

Resilience is a function of both vulnerability and coping capacity. Loreto's resilience is significantly lower than the national average, and its very low Resilience Score (R = 0.412) is due to its very high vulnerability and low coping capacity. The region's baseline indicators suggest a focus for resilience-building efforts. In Loreto, the thematic areas with the weakest indicator scores and rankings are summarized in the table below. Readers can additionally consult Appendix 1 for a comprehensive assessment of its need for specific program types relative to other regions.
